children with the land that sustains us all. And it's what we have been doing in partnership with the brilliant team at the GWCT's Allerton Project at Loddington, for 15 years now. More than a thousand children from the surrounding areas have been welcomed on Country Trust visits — children who have huge potential but very limited opportunities. The warm welcome started with Alastair Leake and his former secretary Natalie Augusztinyi, then the baton was passed to Jim Egan and Amelia Woolford and now it's with Saya Harvey and Joe Stanley.

At the Allerton Project, the ordinary becomes extraordinary. Soil is the rooftop of another world waiting to be discovered; 'grass' in the fields is the source of breakfast cereals; tangled weeds and shrubs are home to a multitude of insects; molehills are archaeological dig sites (wonderful memories of discussing Jim's 'finds' and trying to work out what on earth they might be and how they got there); the countryside is a beautiful and restorative place to be. You'll even find famous faces at Allerton – JB Gill (formerly of the boy band JLS and now a children's TV Presenter and new entrant farmer) joined a Country Trust/Allerton visit some years ago, to the amazement of the visiting children.

The regular flow of Country Trust children helped to secure a grant for the excellent classroom and learning facilities at Loddington. And beyond being a warm, dry and welcoming space for children (with rainwater flushing toilets), the rooms and the handy adjacent farmland have also seen a steady flow of Country Trust Co-ordinators meeting and training there. We have held training sessions for our Discover Warburtons Wheat host famers too.

In the time we have been working with the Allerton team, climate change has risen up the agenda and over the last two years Alastair Leake has generously shared



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his knowledge of and passion for soil with our whole team at our annual conference. He is also an expert contributor helping to shape our Climate Change Farm Discovery programme of 20 school visits, including to Loddington, and he contributed to our Climate Action Farm in a Box which was ordered by 1,000 teachers. And the Climate Action live zoom session for more than 5,000 children starred Saya and her drone footage.

Our next big programme is a soil health campaign for children and the wider public – you may be able to guess who is first on our list to talk to.

Here's to the next 30 years of building children's confidence, curiosity and connections together, through food, farming and countryside experiences.
